In this risk-free ground of moral neutrality there are no bad choices, just different lifestyles. People aren't the architects of their own problems, they are victims of circumstance.

'Live and let live' becomes 'do what you please.' Well actually, what last week has shown is that this moral neutrality, this relativism – it's not going to cut it any more.

So this must be a wake-up call for our country. Social problems that have been festering for decades have exploded in our face.

We must fight back against the attitudes and assumptions that have brought parts of our society to this shocking state. We know what's gone wrong: the question is, do we have the determination to put it right?

Do we have the determination to confront the slow-motion moral collapse that has taken place in parts of our country these past few generations?

Irresponsibility. Selfishness. Behaving as if your choices have no consequences.

Children without fathers. Schools without discipline. Reward without effort.

Crime without punishment. Rights without responsibilities. Communities without control.

In my very first act as leader of this party I signalled my personal priority: to mend our broken society. That passion is stronger today than ever.

But I repeat today, as I have on many occasions these last few years, that the reason I am in politics is to build a bigger, stronger society.

Stronger families.

Stronger communities.

A stronger society.

Four roles of a father


- 1. A father establishes authority

Three common types of fatherhood deficiency








For many fathers/parents the challenge is...




